[2 b ii] Children with disruptive behaviours

MHYFVic advocates that all schools should have a designated welfare officer, whether teaching staff member or dedicated counsellor, who can monitor the occurrence of disruptive behaviours and other mental health warning signs and can provide supportive consultation to other staff and liaise with counsellors and other service providers.
